We had a variety of celebrity guests who worked wonderfully with the children and got them involved as they learned about how to live a healthy and fit life. Our chef Jason Keusch, head chef from

Troppo, really broke the ice with the children from the moment they got there. He allowed them to feel comfortable preparing food and demonstrated how easy it was to have fun while making healthy snacks. The children from Fairview Elementary and St. Vincents learned to make ants on a log, yogurt on the go, apples and peanut butter, and Chex mix with Chef Jason's guidance. **Kelley Foltz**, a certified personal trainer at the Michigan Athletic Club, was phenomenal when she spoke to the children about what foods to eat, how exercising is all about having fun, and how eating unhealthy food is alright "in moderation."

Also big thanks go out to Michigan State University's Director of Player Development **Dino Folino** for helping recruit MSU football players to attend the event, and attending the whole event himself. The athletes really helped make the event extra special. In both sessions there were enough athletes to assist all children in preparation of their food, and the interaction between child and athlete was amazing. In total 10 MSU football players and one coach attended the event to help the kids and promote the importance of healthy eating and exercise. The children could relate eating properly to excelling in sports, which supported what Kelley and Jason were teaching. Each child left this event with a positive impression of living healthier lives.

Of course none of this would have been possible without **Deb Blake** from Dream Dinners donating her space, time, and help to set up and run this event. Thank you to everyone who attended our March GMM and Placement Fair. What a fun and informative night. It was truly a collaborative effort on everyone's part and I wish to extend my gratitude to you for participating and adding your own personal touch. Not only was information presented in a fun and creative way, but the potluck enabled us to enjoy an added bonus of our membership's culinary talents.

As we start to wind up another League year, I wanted to take a moment to reflect on all that we have accomplished together. It has been an active and very productive time with many successes to look back on.

Turning to our involvement in the community, our signature project, FEAST, is in its second year and is thriving. Of note, WKAR has done a feature on the project and our FEAST logo received an ADDY Award by the American Advertising Federation. Second graders in the Lansing schools are bringing home nutritional facts to share and practice with their families. Our Kids in the Kitchen project, headed up by our New Member class, was a huge success. Another indicator of our positive impact is the Ballentine Award we received from St. Vincent Catholic Charities for our commitment and contributions to the community. Talk about impact, we just awarded a Community Impact Grant of \$10,000 to the City Rescue Mission to build a kitchen in their new Women and Children's Shelter. What an amazing contribution! Our DIAD projects, in conjunction with our Community Service Committee, provided opportunities for our membership to work hands-on with many of our community partners. Ladies, you have truly been on fire this year. With a very successful signature fundraiser, an endowment fund that topped \$500,000 and the addition of our newest members to the Community Advisory Board we are well positioned to continue to positively impact our community. CRPD has completed and shared their research with us, now we begin the process of finding our next signature project. Community \$10,000 Makes an Impact!

As the kitchen is the heart of the home for all of us, so will be the "Classroom Kitchen" at the City Rescue Mission. The Community Impact Grant, which may be granted in a given year, has been granted in the amount of \$10,000 to the City Rescue Mission

for construction of a new "Classroom Kitchen."

The "Classroom Kitchen" will provide women and children the essentials of meal planning, budgeting, and preparing healthy foods for their families. This will be done with mother and child(ren) side by side learning together about a healthy cooking lifestyle. They will also be taught the proper way to handle food and how to sanitize the kitchen as to not spread germs.

Since 1911 the City Rescue Mission has serviced their guests with food, shelter, and training, meeting the needs of homeless men, women and children in the Lansing area. Last year alone the City Rescue Mission serviced 363 women and 212 children. With the rise of poverty and homelessness of women and children in Michigan, the City Rescue Mission, which will be relocated to Maplewood School, will be able to meet the needs of homeless women and children in our community.

The Junior League of Lansing is thankful for the opportunity to partner with the City Rescue Mission, making an impact not only for women and children at risk currently, but for generations to come.

Community Response Grant Responds

he Junior League Response Grant, which is granted quarterly, has been granted to Reach Out and Read Michigan and Haven House.

Haven House meets the needs of homeless

families in the greater Lansing area. Haven House will be using the \$1050.00 to buy vinyl mattress pads for the 28 beds the shelter provides for homeless families. These vinyl covers will assist with sterilizing the rooms between families and help save the mattress themselves. Haven House provided shelter for over one hundred families, totaling 7,653 nights of shelter for last year alone!

Reach Out and Read Michigan will use \$500.00 granted to them to purchase child size tables, chairs, and bookshelves for the waiting room at the Well-Child Health Center. Reach Out and Read promotes early literacy by making books a routine part of pediatric primary care. Reach Out and Read has served 2,376 children under the age of five since 2006, most of these children fall 200% below the poverty level. The Junior League book nook will provide parents and children a literacy rich environment that will serve for years to come.

- I. Welcome—Becky Myers, President, greeted members and called the meeting to order at 6:38 PM.
- II. Approval of Minutes for January and February—Becky Myers, President. Jaimie Hutchison made a motion to approve the January and February General Membership Minutes. Second by Nancy Nyquist. Motion carried.

III. Improving the Community

- a. Focus Advertising—Kay Donahue, Publications Editor Chair, reminded membership that Focus articles are due tomorrow by 5 PM. Kay stated that the Focus publication reaches over 400 homes and would be great place to advertise for local businesses, please contact her if you are interested.
- b. Day at the Capitol—Gabrielle Johnson updated the membership about the Day at the Capitol event earlier today. Eleven members of the Lansing League attended. The Junior League of Lansing received a tribute for their dedication to the community from Representative Joan Bauer and Senator Gretchen Whitmer.
- c. Community Grants—Betsy Svanda, Community Vice President, advised membership that \$1,050 of Community Response Grant was given to Haven House to purchase covers for the beds and \$500 to Reach Out and Read. The Community Sponsorship was given to Women Working Wonders (\$1,500), Kaleidoscope 2008 (\$1,000), Ronald McDonald House Bowl-a-Thon (\$250), and Expectant Parents Organization (\$500). The next grant will be distributed during the next quarter starting in April.
- d. Kids in the Kitchen—Lynn Garrett and Christina Williams, New Member Project Chairs, advised that Kids in the Kitchen will be this Saturday, March 15th at Dream Dinners in Frandor.
- e. **DIAM—Suzanne Johnson**, Done In A Day, advised items donated tonight will be given to St. Vincent's. Drawing performed.

IV. Developing Our Potential

- a. **Treasurer's Report—Alex Wiesner**, Treasurer, updated the membership on the current status of the 2007–2008 budget. Budget was distributed. Alex requested members review the budget and ask any questions. Discussion ensued.
- b. **2008–2009 Budget Proposal—Alex Wiesner**, Treasurer, referred membership to the proposed 2008–2009 budget. Membership will be holding a clothing drive at our April meeting and the weekend after for drop off at the League office. Women and children clothes, accessories, and shoes are welcome. Also, we will be helping teen mothers that are continuing their education with Meridian High School by providing them with clothes and other child needs. We are also supporting the Women's Center of Greater Lansing by purchasing and/or donating books that help support women. We are donating a book case and are hoping to fill the case with new books.
- d. Membership Awards—Kimberly Garrison, membership Vice President, advised that it is time to submit names to recognize excellence within league.

- · Diana Mitchell, Treasurer, advised the Board that affective February 15, 2008 she will resign from the Treasurer position. She has done a tremendous job.

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Planning AJLI 2007–08 Profile Data

would like to take this opportunity to share some information gained at the Winter Leadership Conference. AJLI conducted online surveys to gather data about what is happening in the Leagues across the Association. 239 of 293 Leagues responded to

this very detailed survey. It provided information regarding Communications, Community Programming, Governance, League Operations and Membership. There are 15 topics they studied in depth and I would like to highlight a few for you.

Overall, we (as an association) are maintaining membership (-0.9) and have seen a slight increase in New Members (+1.5%). Personal solicitation and individual inquiry remain the top two ways of recruitment. Surprisingly, the website recruits more members than member events. We are currently looking into improving our website capabilities. This data supports our decision to do so. 171 Leagues have Sustainer Advisors on Committees and we are fortunate to have dedicated Sustaining Members.

Fund Development is an area that is changing rapidly and the Leagues have responded. Currently, 136 Leagues have a Fund Development Plan in place. There are Endowment Funds, Annual Campaigns, Planned Giving Programs, Grants, Fundraisers and a variety of means to raise funds. 45 Leagues still maintain Thrift Shops and 20 have produced a cookbook in the last two years. We currently have an ad hoc committee working on our Fund Development Plan. They have found that it is essential to link Fundraising to the Mission.

Websites are playing an increasing role in our operations. 218 Leagues use website links or banner adds to raise awareness. Many have the capabilities to pay dues, order tickets for fundraisers, purchase merchandise, register for events and make contributions. 8 Leagues offer online member training. 49 Leagues outsource their website maintenance and updating.

There is a great deal of information about Community Impact and accomplishments made in the Leagues. I encourage you to look at the slide show on the AJLI website to learn even more. As League leaders learned at the 2007 Fall Leadership Conference, the AJLI Board of Directors has launched a long-term strategic initiative called "Scenario Planning." The initiative is designed to help us anticipate how The Junior League will continue to thrive 10–20 years from now. The Scenario Planning process examines the influences and changes to the world around us and combines that information with what we want our organization to be and what we acknowledge to be our organizational core competencies.

At the recent Winter Leadership Conference in San Antonio, AJLI President-Elect, Debbie Brown Robinson, presided over a plenary session along with Matt Ranen of the world-renowned consulting firm, Global Business Network, which is guiding AJLI's Scenario Planning process. Ranen, along with Robinson, highlighted emerging trends that will impact the future of both AJLI and the Junior Leagues and asked important questions for anticipating ways to remain relevant and thrive in the decades to come.

These questions included:

- 1. If you were to create a new Junior League in the year 2028, what would be the three most important characteristics of this new organization?
- 2. What would the Junior Leagues no longer be doing in the year 2028—what would no longer be relevant?
- 3. What would be the most important aspect of The Junior League in 2028—a non-negotiable element, in your opinion?
- 4. What would be new about The Junior League in 2028?
- 5. Who are the members of The Junior League in 2028?
- 6. What are their characteristics?
- 7. What draws these members to The Junior League of 2028?

League leaders present at the plenary session provided a number of interesting answers. Many saw the future of AJLI as a high-tech, global organization. Others saw added diversity among Junior League membership and all agreed that the organization would remain committed to its Mission.

The AJLI Board of Directors encourages each and every Junior League member to consider these questions. As we move forward, input from Leagues, which we are gathering in various ways, will help form the outcome of the Scenario Planning process. The end result will be an association and Leagues that are equipped to thrive in a rapidly changing future.

We will continue to update you on Scenario Planning and the critical roles every League can play in helping to shape the future of our international organization.

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Policy Change

Gabrielle Johnson, Bylaws/Policy/Parliamentarian



Our policy changes this month are brought to us by the Community Vice President. The current reading of Policy 6.3 addresses only the Community Impact Grant. However, as there are additional Community Sponsorship monies that the Junior League

disburses to organizaions around our community, the new policy recognizes them. The policy includes the Community Impact Grant, as well as the Community Sponsorship and the Community Response Grant, a change which is now reflected in the Redbook.

Additionally, the duties of the Community Vice President have been better defined. Previously in the Redbook, her responsibilities were to "...chair the Community Council and coordinate this League's adopted projects impacting the community." (Bylaws, page 11 section e.)

The new policy goes on to include "She shall also be responsible for the Community Sponsorship line item by evaluating and soliciting applicants, and presenting all applicants to the Board of Directors for approval." (Bylaws, page 11 section e.)

Continuing with our theme of revamping the Community Sponsorship Language, Policy 13.1c has been proposed and adopted. The new policy reads "There will be a line item within the Junior League's budget, as determined by the current Board of Directors, for Community Sponsorships. The sponsorship monies shall be given to an organization that supports the JLL mission within the Greater Lansing Area. The purpose of the Community Sponsorship is to stimulate interest in Junior League activities and maintain or increase our visibility within the community."

The procedure for administering this grant is included in the new policy and reads "1. The Community Vice President shall be responsible for evaluating and soliciting applicants for Community Sponsorship. 2. Community Sponsorship shall be approved by the Board of Directors."

Rec Specs[®], carrots, polycarbonate, finger puppets, oysters, nuts, Baby Banz... what do all of these things have in common? They are vitally important in the eye health of your child. Polycarbonate lenses are virtually shatterproof and they are another recommendation we make for all children's eyewear. Finally, there's UV protection-another critical issue for kids. Baby Banz and other similar products offer this protection, which must block 99-100% of UV rays. For the smallest of children the first step is keeping harm away from children's sensitive eyes.

Encouraging proper nutritional habits is important as well. This includes the need for zinc (in oysters, beef, fish and chicken) and beta-carotene (in carrots and spinach).

Eating right may protect against age-related eye disease in the future including cataracts and age-related macular degeneration. If no allergies exist, these are important sources of the nutrients we all need—get to know your vegetables and color up your child's plate for healthy vision!
