While what we do has not changed, how we talk about it is now wrapped in language that is more accessible, inviting, and collaborative. Additionally, the Nominating Committee worked hard to prepare the 2023-2024 slate and helped facilitate our second Community Fund vote. Our Active membership and leadership voted for Advent House to receive a donation of \$5,023. The Board also approved JLL's donation of \$1,000 to Ele's Place, one of our Legacy projects, to support its November Children's Grief Awareness Month Campaign and approved \$1,000 to the Greater Lansing Food Bank for its Empty Plates Dinner Fundraiser. With a focus on acknowledging hard work throughout the year, we also brought back "kudos." We had multiple monthly nominations of members recognizing each other for going above and beyond their placements.

The Board also continues to work on updating our policies and implementing the feedback and questions posed in the 2022 League Summit and 2023 Mid-Year Review. We have helped solidify processes and worked with our association management firm to strengthen our League.

For the last month or so, I've been reflecting on Stacy Bogard's question while driving home from the AJLI Annual Conference. She asked me, *"What will you miss?"*

The first thing that came to mind was sarcasm - what could I miss from a full-time job that doesn't pay? But that's not really how I feel. I will miss all of it, the good, bad, and the ugly. The good things are spending time with all of you at GMMs, sitting around the board table thinking of our mission, discussing ways we can make members' experience in the League better, brainstorming ways we can fundraise more money to give back to the community - but the best "good" is the lifelong friendships.

The last three years have given me leadership experience that I couldn't have obtained anywhere else - I've learned to mediate, make risk assessments, coach people, be the person people vented to, be a cheerleader, and learn from my mistakes. I am always in awe of how lucky I am to be part of an organization that allows me to surround myself with the most intelligent, hardworking women. I'm going to miss all of it. And although my husband can attest I'm not allowed to watch the last episode of "The Office" because I cry every time I see it, Andy Bernard is so accurate when he says, "I wish there were a way to know you're in the good old days before you've left them." INCOMING PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Stephanie Collier, 2023-2025 President

During this time of transition from one League year into the next, I want to thank all of you, our members. It is always awe-inspiring when we get to the end of each League year and genuinely look back at our accomplishments. You have grown and strengthened as leaders through our GMM education series, SLBI (Small Leagues, Big Impact), and AJLI (Association of Junior Leagues International) opportunities and your experiences within your placements. Our community has benefited immensely through the hard work and dedication of all of you. You have provided countless hours of volunteer efforts, raised over \$21,000 net, and in turn, we've been able to disperse over \$25,000 back into the community through our grants. You are a truly gifted and fantastic group of women, and I am grateful and humbled for the opportunity to serve as your President for the next two years.



We have recently updated our mission to align with what the Junior League is today: *The Junior League of Lansing is an organization of women whose mission is to advance women's leadership for meaningful community impact through volunteer action, collaboration, and training.* We are no longer simply developing the potential of women because we are all leaders already. We lead at home, in our careers, and in communities. Reflecting on this new mission allows us to set the stage for what is to come and strategically focus the efforts and impact that the Junior League of Lansing will have on our members and the community.

Before we look ahead to what's to come, I would like to take a moment and honor where we've been:

We have accomplished so much as a League (since being founded in 1931). In 1948, the Junior Service League became the Junior League of Lansing. With that transition, this year we celebrated our 75th anniversary as an Association of Junior Leagues International member. "The JLL played an integral role in bringing the American Red Cross and the Sight Conversation Program (later adopted by the Lions Club) to Lansing in the 1940s. In the 1970s, the JLL was one of the first organizations to pledge money for the Impression 5 Science Museum," ¹ and in 1973, the Cedar Chest was re-envisioned from the original Junior League shop called The Resale Shop (opened in 1939 originally). In the 1980s, some of our League's completed projects included a "60-plus health center at St. Lawrence Hospital, the parent recreation and involvement program of the Family Growth Center, a research guide called 'Lansing, a Capital Idea,' and Camp Highfields." ² Then "the JLL started to extend our interest into public policy areas. In the 1990s, JLL led the charge in bringing Ele's Place, Ballentine Stepping Stones, and Otto Health Clinic to our community." ¹ In the 2010s, we transitioned to an issue-based community impact focus and have been dedicated to the issues of food, shelter, and access to food and shelter by providing countless hours of volunteering and granting well over \$100,000 in support of our communities needs.

As we look to our future, I find that Jacquline Novogratz, Founder of Acumen/Amazing Women, conveys it best: "Honor what is most beautiful about the past, and build it into the promise of the future."

Our past is inspiring and our future is bright. For the 2023-2024 League year, the Board of Directors will assess and update our current Strategic Plan, which will expire in June 2024.

As part of this planning, we recently created the Community Area Resource Examination (CARE) Task Force, led by our Community Vice President Lisa Biering. The charge of CARE is to review the issue area that the Junior League of Lansing will strategically focus on, beginning with the 2024-2025 League year. Through this process, CARE will seek to learn and understand the most underserved and pressing needs of our Greater Lansing community. The work of CARE, presented for membership review and dialogue throughout the fall, will be up for a vote in early 2024. Rest assured, we are staying open to the possibility that our efforts may need to stay right where they currently are. We invite all our members, Sustainers and Actives alike, to join the task force and directly impact this critical discussion. Together we are the current stewards of this unique organization. When we stay focused on our mission through our commitment to grow and develop as civic leaders, our collective and strategic efforts will undoubtedly continue to compound and cascade positive impact on our community. Thank you to those who have created the legacy of the Junior League of Lansing, and I am excited to be partnering with all of you for what is to come.

As community members, we are responsible for contributing positively to its well-being. The Junior League of Lansing's members believe that. Our impact can be so much more profound when we pool our resources, creating greater unity, cooperation, and shared purpose among individuals.

For the 2022-2023 League year, our members engaged in collective and individual community service initiatives. Our highlights include the following:

- Giving more than \$25,000 in grants to area nonprofits working to solve issues around food, shelter and access to food and shelter.
- · Volunteering more than 320 hours for area nonprofits.

GRANTS

2023 is a special year. The League awarded three types of grants.

1. Community Fund Grant

Nominated and selected by the membership, Advent House Ministries received \$5,023.

2. Community Response Grants

Selected by a special Grant Review Committee, these grants range from \$500 to \$1,500. In total, we awarded \$5,000 to seven organizations:

- The Basic Needs Center for \$500
- Christ Temple Church for \$750
- Covered by Love for \$500
- Small Talk Children's Advocacy Center for \$1,000
- South Lansing Ministries for \$500
- Southside Community Center for \$1,000
- STREETS 517 for \$750

3. Community Impact Grant

Awarded whenever the Reserve Fund exceeds \$85,000, \$15,000 was given to Who Am I – I am Me!, which is also known as the RISE Recovery Center. It is an addiction treatment center in Lansing founded by a mother and son who survived nearly a decade in the world of addiction. The center provides stable housing for those coming out of treatment, support groups and more to those in recovery. The grant will be used to purchase 41 beds and mattresses for the RISE recovery house.

VOLUNTEER HOURS

Our members gave over 370 hours of their time to the community. Their volunteering efforts included: food distribution for local food banks, managing a community baby shower, arranging floral bouquets for hospice patients, ringing the bell for Salvation Army during the holidays, preparing dinner for a local shelter, and much more.



EDUCATION

TRAINING

Sustaining Member Advisor Meredith Jagutis and Education VP Leia Cooper-Rigg worked closely together this year tapping into the extensive knowledge base within our own League and community to provide valuable and impactful training for our membership.

In January, Meredith spoke about Fund Development and Ann Volgelsang on the Endowment Fund. In March, a wonderful training was provided by Sustainer Katie Strong on "Communicating with Confidence." Our April training was a Placement Panel in which various leaders in League, Tricia Brentar, Brittany Risk, Leia Cooper-Rigg, Stacy Bogard, Stephanie Collier, and Maggie Louks, discussed various positions, leadership, and their experiences within League. Finally, in May we had Cornerstone Legal's Katrina Hofstetter talk to us about the legalities of starting a business.



This year marks the 38th anniversary of the Junior League of Lansing Endowment Fund. The Endowment supports the mission of JLL in perpetuity, and we are grateful to our founding members for the foresight to establish this endowment fund to benefit the women of this community.

As of June 30, 2023, the current fund balance is \$696,739. As our Endowment Fund balance grows, its financial impact on our League will continue to grow.

FUND DEVELOPMENT

A NEW FUNDRAISER INTRODUCED



We switched things up this League year and introduced a new fundraiser event: bRUNch and Walk with League 5K, replacing our long-running Lunch with League fundraiser. The 5K fundraiser event allowed our community members to learn about the Junior League of Lansing's impact on the mid-Michigan community, raise funds to further JLL's mission, and as a member engagement activity. Half of our Active members showed up either as participants or assisted the day of. Seeing and meeting many of our members' most prominent supporters, families, and friends was a pleasure.

The Fundraising Event Committee did a fabulous job executing a new fundraiser and ensuring our inaugural bRUNch and Walk with League 5K was a huge success, surpassing all goals set. The 5K saw 129 registered participants and 36 community sponsors and had a net profit of just under \$11,000.

Thank you to all our bRUNch and Walk with League 5K community sponsors, but a special mention to our community sponsors at the Marathoner level and above.

FUNDS RAISED FOR OUR MISSION
